DIRECTOR'S NOTE

My late theatre advisor, Dr. Sandra Hardy, had a quote on her office door (in decadent font, playfully adorned with flowery swirls by adoring/terrified students) that read "I'm not the person everyone counts on to serve the vanilla ice cream."

While she was an undeniable force of nature, Sandra was also a great humanist. She believed with her whole being in the power of the arts to challenge perceptions, or to shed light on issues/concepts/populations that may not receive the societal "airtime" that they likely deserve. She also taught me the term "tragicomedy" - a term that my cast has heard me say all too often. It's fitting then, that one of her favorite shows was *The Boys Next Door*, a show which fully embodies both of these concepts.

Perceptions of the intellectually disabled have come a long way, gaining significant ground even in recent years. However, even with the best of intentions, society often ends up treating this group like they're fragile, rather than capable, handling them with kid gloves instead of genuine respect. It's important to remember that these people are in fact, just that: people. True equality is the ability to see them, laugh with them, and experience the world alongside them, instead of trying to guess at what things must be like from their perspective. To treat this population with the dignity and love that they deserve, we cannot be afraid to see their triumphs and shortcomings, as we would anyone else's. Happiness is universal, failure is a part of life, and humor is humanizing.

This show also makes note of the high burnout potential that pervades caretaking professions. Caretaking work is often thankless, pays poorly, and strains other facets of the caretaker's life, outside of work. While we see this reflected onstage in Jack's journey, we can see many forms of the exhausted caretaker right here in our own communities. They deserve our appreciation, and honestly, probably a little slack.

On a personal note, I wanted to use this platform, however small, to thank the incredible people involved in the Virginia theatre scene. This show, which deals with themes of community, belonging, acceptance and change is a fitting end to the wild run of seven shows that I've directed here over the past two years. This show has tied a bow on my time in Virginia theatre quite well: I'm working with a team of people, both onstage and off, who have been collected and curated through my interactions these last two seasons, mounting a show that holds personal significance to me, and producing it at the theatre where I first directed in the area, right here at PCT. As a bonus: it's set in New England, the part of the country where I grew up, and where I'll next be stationed.

So thank you all for journeying with me over these past two years. I'm humbled to have played the part I have in a community that means so much to me. To Jeff, Amanda, Riley, John, Jake, and my cast & crew: thank you for all that you've given to me in this and previous shows, and for what you've given to this production. To the audience: none of this happens without you. Thank you for journeying with the "boys" and those who make up their surroundings. Thank you, too, for your support of this show, its themes, and the most vulnerable among us. I hope you'll enjoy sitting among your fellow humans, feeling human feelings, and watching the stories of other humans, no matter how similar to or different from you they might be.

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
